BECAUSE I LIVE, YE SHALL LIVE ALSO

I suspect that you immediately identify the title of this article. Even if you don't recall the exact reference, you probably recognize that it's from scripture and who spoke it. Not simply because it includes the word "Ye" but because of its unique, memorable and powerful nature. This reference is from the last part of the 19th verse of chapter 14 of the Book of John.

The scene for this statement was the Last Supper in the upper room. Jesus had already washed the disciples' feet, dipped the sop and given it to Judas, His betrayer and was now answering several questions that the disciples were asking. Phillip had asked Jesus to show them the Father to satisfy them. From our

perspective, two thousand years later, Phillip's question might seem a bit haughty, untimely or short-sighted. Nevertheless, as He often did through lengthy response, Jesus not only lovingly corrected the reasoning behind the question but gave them much more insight than the inquiry sought. And inside Jesus' response, is the core of the Gospel: "because I live, ye shall live also."

If you will, let's imagine for a moment, being seated with the disciples and Jesus that night in the upper room. Considering the week we had just come through, we might say it had been a whirlwind. Just a few days earlier on Sunday, Jesus had entered Jerusalem riding a donkey and the masses had strewn their

garments and branches before Him for a path. We can picture the obvious excitement, joy and expectation on the faces in the multitude as they cried out "Hosanna to the son of David: Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord: Hosanna in the highest." What a glorious entry that truly was. But soon thereafter, things seemed to deteriorate as Jesus turned the tables of the moneychangers in the temple and then prophesied the destruction of Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives. Why did Jesus do this? The week had started so well but it's souring as He's drawing the ire of powerful religious people. And now, tonight He seems solemn. It seems improper that a man of His significance has bowed and washed our feet. Also confusing, He gave us bread and wine as if it was His body and blood and He speaks of betrayal and offenses among us. What does this all mean?

While confusing, there was one thing in particular that He said that caught our attention. He said, "because I live, ye shall live also." What did He mean by that? What does His being alive have to do with us being alive? Wasn't He just telling us that He

was going to die? How then can we live because He lives if He's going to die?

I think those are excellent questions. And the disciples would all soon understand the awesome answer to those questions, as believers also do today.

Yes, the week in Jerusalem had started off wonderfully but then things turned worse and then bleak and near the end of the week, seemed hopeless. The Master that had entered Jerusalem on Sunday to great jubilance, had in such a short time, been falsely tried, sentenced to death and executed. But then...the tomb was empty! He was victorious over death! He AROSE and IS ALIVE! And not only that, but as we believe in Him, He grants us life also! Because He lives. we shall live also! Praise the Lord!

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved." John 3:16-17

HOLINESS AS ART- ART FROM A BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVE

Musical Art

The third form of art found in the Bible is music, performing the beauty we feel inside. Creation sings in praise to God. "...the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy." (Job 38:7) The heavens are not silent but resounding with the wondrous alory of innumerable stars and heavenly beings singing in worship to the Lord. The psalmist wrote: "Praise ve the LORD from the heavens... Praise ve him, sun and moon: praise ye him all ye stars of light...Let them praise the name of the LORD: for he commanded, and they were created." (Ps. 148:1,3,5)

"All the earth shall worship thee, and shall sing unto thee; they shall sing to thy name." (Ps. 66:4) God created a resonating cosmos that will glorify Him even if we choose not to. "And he answered and said unto them, I tell you that, if these should hold their peace, the stones would immediately cry out." (Luke

19:40) Can't we join creation in praise?

The Old Testament is full of song. The first record of people singing is at the Red Sea when God delivered Israel from the Egyptians. "I will sing unto the LORD, for he hath triumphed gloriously." (Exod. 15:1b) Music was important to Israel in victory, as well as dedication, call to battle, lament, wedding feasts, etc.

When the temple was completed, "It came even to pass, as the trumpeters and singers were as one, to make one sound to be heard in praising and thanking the LORD; and when they lifted up their voice with the trumpets and cymbals and instruments of musick, and praised the LORD... that then the house was filled with a cloud, even the house of the LORD." (II Chr. 5:13a)

When David brought the ark of God up to the tabernacle, the Bible says that "David and all

Israel played before the Lord with all their might, and with singing, and with harps, and with psalteries, and with timbrels, and with cymbals, and with trumpets." (I Chr. 13:8)

Praise to the King is central in the book of Psalms. "Praise ye the LORD. Praise ye the name of the LORD; praise him, O ye servants of the LORD... sing praises unto his name; for it is pleasant." (Ps. 135:1,3)

"Make a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands. Serve the LORD with gladness: come before his presence with singing... Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise..." (Ps. 100:1,2,4)

"The LORD reigneth; let the earth rejoice..." (Ps. 97:1) The book of Psalms ends with a command: "Let every thing that hath breath praise the LORD. Praise ye the LORD." (Ps. 150:6)

"... and they rest not day and night, saying, Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, which was, and is, and is to come." (Rev. 4:8b) In the eternal realm, where all is peace and joy, and Christ reigns forever, the inhabitants will worship and praise the King.

Don't you want to be a part of it?

"The four and twenty elders fall down before him that sat on the throne, and worship him that liveth for ever and ever, and cast their crowns before the throne, saying, 'Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power: for thou hast created all things, and for thy pleasure they are and were created." (Rev. 4:10-11)

"And they sung a new song, saying. Thou art worthy to take the book, and to open the seals thereof: for thou wast slain, and hast redeemed us to God by thy blood out of every kindred. and tongue, and people, and nation...And I beheld, and I heard the voice of many angels round about the throne and the beasts and the elders: and the number of them was ten thousand times ten thousand. and thousands of thousands: Saying with a loud voice, Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honour, and glory, and blessing. And every creature which is in heaven, and on the earth, and under the earth, and such as are in the sea, and all that are in them, heard I saying, Blessing,

and honour, and glory, and power, be unto him that sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb for ever and ever. And the four beasts said, Amen. And the four and twenty elders fell down and worshipped him that liveth for ever and ever." (Rev. 5:9,11-14)

Does that send shivers down your back? Can you feel the swell of the thousands? Hear the perfect harmony in the grandeur of song? More importantly, will you be a part of that great multitude crying "Salvation to our God which sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb."? (Rev. 7:10b)

"Great and marvelous are thy works, Lord God Almighty, just and true are thy ways, thou King of saints." (Rev. 15:3b) "Blessed be the LORD God of Israel from everlasting to everlasting; and let all the people say, Amen. Praise ye the LORD." (Ps. 106:48)

Art in its purest form is Biblical! What are we as Christians living in a fallen world to do with it? "Ye are the salt of the earth...Ye are the light of the world..." (Matt. 5:13,14) "And he gave to some, apostles, and some, prophets; and some,

evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers." (Eph. 4:11) And we might add: artists, musicians, writers, composers, photographers, etc. Every talent that we have is Godgiven. And we are to use them! "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." (Ecc. 9:10) We can use our talents in our home community, to bless our church family, to witness to others, and to show a portion of God's true nature through art. And to fulfill our highest calling: to bring the beauty of heaven to earth by living out our walk with Christ in the beauty of holiness.

But we have a choice. "And Aaron said unto them. Break off the golden earrings, which are in the ears of your wives, of your sons, and of your daughters, and bring them unto me. And all the people brake off the golden earrings which were in their ears, and brought them unto Aaron. And he received them at their hand, and fashioned it with a graving tool, after he had made it a molten calf: and they said, These be thy gods, O Israel, which brought thee up out of the land of Egypt." (Exod. 32:2-4)

Oh, how sad! That they

would use their talents to completely forsake God and turn their worship to a golden calf. How about us? Do we create and turn to God in worship and praise, or do we take the credit and glory to ourselves? "Know ye that the LORD He is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves." (Ps 100:3a)

Here we stand, in conclusion, with the choice of whom to glorify! Because we are created in God's image with the same

desire for beauty and creativity. We can choose the highest form of art in God's eyes and worship Him in the beauty of holiness and praise Him for creating us with the ability to do so. Or we can selfishly use our gifts to create beauty but take the credit to ourselves and miss the highest goal entirely. What kind of art will you choose?

A PICTURE OF COMMUNION

One lump, one loaf, one body: this was the first Lord's Supper. The grain had to die and be crushed in order to unite in one loaf. The outer shell of a seed dies in order for new life to take root in the field and grow a strong stalk to withstand the storms of life. Only in this way can it bear fruit.

For the cause of Christ, each person must die to himself and be crushed together with the rest to become one bread. In this way we follow Christ. Our will must die for the sake of the Church. There are no individual grains visible in the loaf. There is no letter "I" in the word "team".

One seed left by itself can easily be lost. Mingle them all together and a sizeable loaf is made.

Similarly, grapes are pressed together to make wine. Each grape gives all its juice to make the wine. No grape can stay whole or individual. No individual grape or kernel can be part of a whole. To remain single is to spoil. Jesus taught the disciples this vivid picture of community. Jesus became broken bread and poured-out wine for us. Likewise, our own will must be broken and we must be willing to suffer and die as Jesus did. The power of the Holy Ghost shows itself in love and

compassion, the self-sacrificing kind that Jesus had. God's truth is brought forth through His abundant love.

The members fitly framed together love one another as Jesus loved the church and gave Himself for it. The Supper is indicative of our giving all, as Jesus did, to each other. We have become one loaf. No one can be a single child of God. We must commune with others who walk the same paths. The Lord's Prayer shows us: "Our Father... Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our

debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen." Matt. 6:9-13 These are plural terms, not singular. When Christ broke bread, He gave to men, no matter how small the offering. He did not do this alone. In so doing, the small become great and the poor become rich.


King David reigns with the awareness of God's guidance and continues to conquer Israel's enemies. Other nations







Adult Sunday School Lesson Questions

Since July 1985, questions for Sunday School lessons have been published in the Bible Monitor a month prior to the month of study. It is thought this was decided to give teachers ample time for lesson preparation. However, some have recently wondered why the questions are published this long in advance and if a change could be considered to publish the questions concurrently with the Connections article, Phil's Ponderings and the current Sunday School lessons.
