on the planet in one night. But after all, there are 24 time zones on the globe, so he'd have an entire day to complete the task. Then again, if he's magic, what couldn't he accomplish?

Mom didn't take me to see Santa in the stores as she said those were just men dressed as Santa. In reality, she thought a close encounter with these imposters would likely diminish the awe of Santa in my eyes, and she was probably right. I remember a few times hearing other children close to my age discussing Santa and their doubts about him. I tried to avoid these conversations. While I understood that it might be difficult for some to believe, I knew better because my mom wouldn't lie to me.

However, the time eventually came when Mom told me the truth. I remember my heart being poked that day. It had been fun to believe in Santa, and it was a little sad to dismiss that belief. I also came to the knowledge that day that mom could and did keep me in the dark with deceit. I understood that she loved me and had good intentions. She didn't mean any harm and only wanted to foster excitement and

sense of wonder in me as so many parents do in this way with their children. However, I also realized that day that she might not always be truthful with me. Could I trust her?

Years later as we started our own family, questions came to my mind. "Are you going to teach your children about Santa? Wouldn't you enjoy watching the twinkle of excitement in their eyes? You don't want them to miss out on the fun and wonder that you experienced as a kid, do you? What will grandma say if you spoil it for them? Are you going to buck the culture and be a mean parent and rob your children of this joy?"

As the song says, Santa is coming to town and sees you when you're sleeping, he knows when you're awake and he knows if you've been bad or good. So you better be good because he's benevolent and has many presents (blessings) for you. In other words, he's omniscient, omnipresent and being magic, is omnipotent. Sound familiar?

For our children, I decided that if I wanted to lead them down a path of truth towards the Lord, any paths of deceit,

no matter how small, fun or seemingly harmless, should be avoided. Further, if I desired that they someday come to believe in an omniscient, omnipresent and omnipotent Lord, it might not be wise to teach them to believe in a false figure (Santa) embodying those same characteristics.

THE OPEN DOOR TO FAITH

Thomas Edison when he was developing the electric light bulb failed almost 10,000 times. Instead of giving up, he simply said that he now knows 10,000 ways that don't work.

Not all negative is bad because sometimes I need to know what not to do in order to put my focus on what I really should be doing at the time.

For the most part, many Christians do not know what really works in their life. They spend a lot of time frustrated over things that are not working and end up quite discouraged and even depressed.

Many people do not quite understand that every open door was first a closed door. When we find a closed door, we need to understand that it is closed for a reason. A closed door does not mean it will not open eventually. When you come to a closed door, it is not an opportunity to quit. Some

people take it as an opportunity to quit and say, "Well, I guess God doesn't want me to do that."

How many closed doors in my life will I ever experience? I am quite sure I will encounter more closed doors than open doors. I am quite sure that in my walk with the Lord there will be a lot more opposition than there will be encouragement.

I do not need to fear the source of the opposition just as I do not need to miscalculate the source of my encouragement. God's encouragement always overcomes the opposition in my life. I need to give God an opportunity to deal with me at that closed-door moment.

As someone has said, a negative can only be a negative if there is a positive, you need both. Many people only want the positive in their life. Sometimes a closed door is simply a challenge to our faith. A closed door does not necessarily mean that it is

locked. It might mean that I need to take some initiative action to open that door. The door before me can be challenged as I step forward and open it.

I need to be careful that my faith is being nurtured every day so that when I experience a closed door, my life does not just shut down. My faith needs to rise at that occasion and challenge the closed door. My opposition must be challenged by my faith. And as always, faith wins every time.

Each day that I experience some opposition or a closed door, my faith is getting stronger and stronger. Everything that comes into my life can be a challenge to my faith in God and a reminder that it is not my strength that survives, but rather my faith in God.

I need to figure out the difference between my strength and my faith in God. Once I have that worked out, I begin to see things that I can do over here, but then things over on the other side that I can only do through faith. My faith will always be challenged, which serves to encourage and strengthen me as I face the opposition.

There is another aspect to

consider. Sometimes a closed door is God's way to redirect us. Nothing we do overcomes that closed door, but instead of giving up, I need to sit down and pray about what is in front of me. Maybe that closed door is God redirecting me in a direction that he wants me to go.

We need to understand that walking in faith is not an easy thing to do. There are some challenges, of course, as well as opposition along the way. But there is also that aspect of God redirecting us in a way that will bring honor and glory unto Him. If I come against a closed door, I need to realize what is happening at this point. What is going on here? Which direction do I need to go?

Another aspect of the closed door is, it may be Satan trying to defeat me. I need to realize in my life there is going to be that influence of Satan. If I am determined to go in God's direction, Satan is just as determined to keep me from going in that direction.

As I encounter a closed door, I need to ask myself several things. Is this of God? Is this Satan trying to redirect me? Have I made a mistake?

Or, is this a challenge to my faith to continue to go in the same direction despite the opposition?

Nothing is more important than walking in faith. Faith will bring me to a closed door, but in God's will, faith also will enable me to open that door. It may not be easy and it may be a struggle with all but overwhelming opposition. However, if I put my faith and

trust in God, that open door will be the beginning of victory one way or the other.

Nobody remembers Edison's 10,000 failures, but we all remember the light bulb.

The stronger the opposition the greater the grace.

Brethren Assembly Proceedings Book Released

A new book entitled “Brethren Faithfulness: Priorities In Perspective” has been released by Brethren Encyclopedia, Inc., and is now available to the public. The book contains transcripts of papers and addresses given at the Seventh Brethren World Assembly held in Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania, in July of 2023.

Every five years representatives of the nine largest Brethren bodies descended from the German Pietist Alexander Mack (1679-1735) gather to spend several days reflecting on their common

historical roots. They hear scholarly papers, worship together, and hear what each of the groups is currently focusing on for strategic direction and growth.

This 245-page trade paperback, which retails for \$25 per copy, was edited by Maryland pastor Dan Thornton, who served as chair for the 2023 gathering. The 2023 Assembly marked 300 years since the organization of the first Brethren congregation in America in Germantown, Pennsylvania, and 100 years of the Brethren presence in Nigeria. Therefore, speakers and scholars focused primarily on the Brethren presence in America during the 1700s.

The book opens with a chapter entitled “What Led the Brethren to America?” and succeeding chapters focus on the expansion of the Brethren movement, the challenge of the American Revolution and impact of Christopher Saur II, the legacy of Alexander Mack, Jr., Brethren attitudes toward slavery, and a summary of 100 years of the Church of the Brethren growth in Nigeria.

Brethren Encyclopedia publishes encyclopedias and monographs of Brethren interest. The group is comprised of representatives of the groups descended from Alexander Mack, which include Church of the Brethren, Covenant Brethren Church, Charis Fellowship, The Brethren Church, Dunkard Brethren Church, Conservative Grace Brethren Churches International, and three groups from the Old Order German Baptist Brethren heritage.
