DNA

What is DNA? Most of us know a little about it or at least think we do and may refer to it sometimes in our speech. DNA is in each of us. It has to do with who we are and with why each of us are unique. But what really is DNA?

The acronym DNA stands for Deoxyribonucleic Acid. That's hard to say and remember and as most of us don't understand organic chemistry well enough to grasp meaning from that title, let's stick with DNA for now.

DNA is in every living organism. In people, it is composed of a sequence of approximately 3 billion nucleotide bases that are connected as a strand. The DNA molecule is composed of a connected and matching double

strand that takes the form of a double helix (picture a spiraling ladder). The average length of a DNA molecule is about 6 feet. Incredibly, there are 46 of these DNA molecules tucked inside a human cell. More fascinating still, the diameter of the average human cell is about 25 micrometers (millionths of a meter). Therefore, the 46, 6-foot-long DNA molecules are about 80,000 times longer than the width of the cells they are comfortably arranged within. For illustrative comparison, imagine packing 46 strings that are each 12 miles long into a basketball.

Most cells of our bodies contain DNA, with the exception of red blood cells and platelets and it has been estimated that the average human body is

composed of approximately 30 trillion cells. For another mind-boggling consideration, if all the strands of DNA in the human body were linked end-to-end, they would stretch a distance of approximately 70 billion miles, which is a distance greater than traveling to the moon and back 140,000 times.

The DNA in one human cell encodes approximately 1.5 gigabytes of information and one gram of DNA (weight of a paperclip) can hold 700 terabytes of information. Put another way, one gram of human DNA can store more data than all the books in the Library of Congress in Washington D.C., which is currently considered the world's largest library.

That is incomprehensible. Much as we can't truly understand the vastness of outer space, we can't really grasp the molecular complexity of life at the microscopic level. All life forms, including our bodies, are unfathomably complex.

So, did all of this just happen by chance? Is life simply the outcome of millions or billions of years of mistakes of nature? Did the absence of life accidentally create life?

Many secular organizations and even some religious groups teach that life formed from non-living compounds that evolved into self-replicating molecular systems. Science books on this subject typically include an illustration of a "simple" cell or organism as the earliest life form. But even the simplest of unicellular life forms (often considered to be bacteria) contain their own DNA. As technology advances, we continue to be able to look deeper into the microscopic construct of life than in the past. As this scientific knowledge grows, it becomes increasingly difficult to ignore the fact that there's simply no such thing as simple cells or organisms. All life is miraculously complex.

The complexity and design of living things make God's existence, power and nature evident, even to those who don't desire to believe in a creator God. As recorded in Rom. 1:20, "*For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse.*"

We may hear quite a bit of false teaching these days, but this is nothing new. Nearly 2,000 years ago, Timothy was warned not to fall for false teaching, even on the subject of science. *“O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust, avoiding profane and vain babblings, and oppositions of science falsely so called: Which some professing have erred concerning the faith. Grace be with thee. Amen.”* 1 Tim. 6:20-21

Likewise, may we be wary

of false teaching. May we stand firm in the faith and trust the truth that we know from God’s word. As Rom. 1:20 tells us, being part of God’s creation, may we clearly see and understand the invisible things of God. May we also remember that not everything with a “science” label is true science. Some things taught in the name of science would actually be *“oppositions of science falsely so called”* that Timothy was warned about.

FORGOTTEN DOLLS

In October of 1984 I had the privilege of going with my parents on my first of our many trips to Spain. This happened to be during the Cabbage Patch Kids doll craze that affected much of our world. After 3 years of high school Spanish, I was eager to immerse myself in the culture and test my conversational skills with native Spanish speakers.

After landing on the southern coast of Spain, we checked into our hotel, exchanged currency and picked up our rental car. The streets in the Spanish towns are very narrow, so all the

vehicles are small. Here I was having a good time conversing with the Spanish people in their native language.

While exploring the local shops, we had our first encounter with Cabbage Patch dolls, which were literally stacked to the ceiling in the aisles. The Spanish people hardly had any interest in the dolls, and the price tag was only \$19. In America, it was a totally different story. The dolls triggered a massive panic. Demand was so high, they caused riots and violent, unruly behavior in United States

retail stores. The dolls were flying off the shelves the second they arrived, and they were selling for as much as \$80. Massive demand and limited supply prompted parents to engage in fighting, shoving, and shouting matches to secure the dolls. Some incidents required police intervention. A manager at a department store used a baseball bat to defend himself against surging crowds. Frustrated shoppers were calling relatives nationwide to see if there was any way they could possibly get a doll for them.

Far more than a doll, each unique Cabbage Patch Kid came with personalized adoption papers, a birth certificate and a unique name. Children participated in an emotional lifelike experience where they adopted their doll from doctors and nurses, requiring them to sign a pledge to love and care for their new addition.

The Cabbage Patch doll craze lasted only a few short years. Then the excitement totally vanished. Sadly, there is another craze in our world that sometimes lasts only a few short years as well. Some

Christians are excited about living the Christian life only to give up in just a few short years. The excitement they had for God vanished, just like the excitement people had for the Cabbage Patch dolls. As the craze for the dolls cooled over time and they were set aside and forgotten, so it has been with some that knew God and turned away from Him. Why did their desire for God wane?

As a brotherhood, we went from a 2-week revival meeting to 1-week, to half a week, to sometimes a weekend. For a weekend, it hardly seems fitting to even call it a revival meeting. Some of those 2-week services were standing room only as the seats were all filled! If somebody got to a service twenty minutes before starting time at some of the Frystown Dunkard Brethren church revival meetings, they had to stand in a long waiting line just to get in the door. Our faith does not require our attendance at long revival meetings. However, could the decrease in duration and attendance of our meetings be a bellwether of spiritual decline? In the mid 1980's, roughly 70% of U.S. adults were members of a church, synagogue, or

mosque. Today, that figure has dropped to roughly 45%.

Why do you think the interest in following God has diminished so much? Mark 13:13 says: *“And ye shall be hated of all men for my name’s sake: but he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved.”* Are people afraid of being hated by others? The Christian life isn’t a 50-yard dash but is rather a long marathon.

Those attending general conference this year have a good opportunity to focus and get closer to God. May we take the opportunities we’re given to focus on God, seek His face, encourage our brothers and sisters and endure to the end, that we not set aside and forget our God.

“Christianity will fall – it will disappear. Today we are more popular than Jesus.” These are words spoken in the 1960’s by John Lennon, a spokesperson for the singing group The Beatles. He later apologized, but he was shot by a disgruntled fan in 1980. If often pays to weigh one’s words carefully.

Marilyn Monroe was perhaps the most famous actress of the 1950’s. One day in 1962, she received a visitor at her home. It was Billy Graham, the most famous evangelical preacher of the era. Monroe told him, “I don’t need your Jesus.” A week later,

This is only a short list of the unfortunate souls who did not think that God was a threat to

them. Many places in the Holy Scripture, Jesus says, "Follow me." If we do follow Him, he will be faithful and see us through to the courts of glory. Why do people hesitate? Those of us reading this account can probably think of others who mocked God. Now we must think of those who have passed on with those terrible words on their lips. What was God's answer? CONNECTIONS

As members of the Bible Study Board our hope in writing monthly articles related to the Adult Sunday School Lessons is that we all see afresh different points of connection that reveal the Word made flesh.

Stephen's sermon in Acts 7 carried significant weight for his audience and should still impact our spiritual lives today. The main point of the discourse is that Israel had a consistent history of resisting the Holy Spirit and rejecting God's Messengers - from Joseph, to Moses, to Jesus. Stephen argued that God is not confined to the Temple, which the people in his audience idolized, and that they were stiff-necked people who had a habit of breaking His covenants, like their ancestors had done. The conclusion of Stephen's sermon brought accusations, directly to the council, of not keeping the law that they claimed to protect.

Interestingly, Stephen did not spend time defending himself against the false

charges. Instead, he focused on glorifying God by sharing the truth of the Gospel. His primary concern was not his reputation, but rather God's redemptive work.

Today, when we shift our focus from self-defense to declaring God's glory, our perspective changes. The perspective God gives us keeps us focused on His redemptive work in our lives and the lives of people around us. We will be more concerned with glorifying Him than winning an argument. May we, like Stephen, be faithful to the covenant we have made to God and to living for His glory.

General Conference 2026

The Lord willing, this year's General Conference of the Dunkard Brethren Church will be held June 6-10, 2026, at Manchester University in North Manchester, Indiana.

Reservations must be received by May 23rd.

We believe the university campus is suitable for all ages and will suit us well. The buildings are all close together, and there is an open yard for play. We plan to have activities for children as well as complete access to two gyms. There are four camper hookups on the campus and a campground within 10 minutes.

Check-in will be in the Jo Young Switzer Center on East Street. Check-in will not be available prior to 2 p.m. on Friday. When making your travel plans, be aware that the university will charge a \$5 per-person fee for anyone checking in between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. You will also need to be checked out of your sleeping rooms by 2 p.m. on Wednesday.

There are some things you will need to bring and some things you will need to leave at home. No linens, pillows or towels are provided; please bring your own. All of the rooms have two twin beds. Golf carts will be available to assist with transportation. If you plan to bring your own golf cart, only electric golf carts are permitted upon the college's approval. No animals (except guide dogs for the blind), tobacco, alcohol, drugs, weapons, explosives, fireworks, or other controlled substances are permitted on the campus. Equipment and furnishings may not be removed from any room without permission from the college. Large refrigerators are available in

the lobby area of each dorm building. A limited number of small refrigerators are available if medically necessary (a \$5/day fee will apply). Free laundry facilities are available on site. Detergent is not supplied. Ice machines are also available in all dorm buildings. Small appliances such as radios, fans and clocks are permitted in the residence hall rooms. Cooking appliances are not allowed in residence hall rooms. All residence halls are equipped with kitchenettes in the common living areas, and all sleeping buildings have air conditioning.

The first time you send an email to the group from your email address, the message will not go out to the group until the moderator approves it, so there will likely be a delay in your first email being sent. This is to ensure that emails are coming from a valid member and not spam or something nefarious. Subsequent messages that you send will not require moderator approval and will go to the group immediately.
