An interesting idea. What I found fascinating though was watching the people in

this game. Some were quite pleased with taking any piece that their dime fell into, while others spent more dimes striving for a particular piece. In most accounts, people appeared quite satisfied with collecting their new trophy. What would they do with this new treasure? Would a coffee mug be used as a coffee mug alongside others in the cabinet or have a special role holding coins on a desk or become the home for a small plant? Would a vase be used to hold flowers or become a different decoration and be filled with different colored sands? I wondered these things as I looked into the faces of those collecting their new prizes.

Another thing that intrigued me was that the cups, mugs, bowls, vases, etc. were not new

crystal or otherwise valuable glassware. Rather, they were used, and most had probably spent decades in cabinets, drawers, tables or on shelves before being brought now to the dime toss table. Their quality and character was that often seen at garage sales and thrift stores. Many may not have been worth the dime that bounced off them or clinked inside them. However, their new owners saw value in them and were willing to risk a dime, a few dimes or many dimes to acquire them.

This reminded me of the human situation before God and how He views us. From our human perspective, we might see ourselves a little like the old pieces of used glassware; each one unique but of limited use, nothing special and of little value. However, the Lord has a different perspective. He created us in His image, in the image of the Almighty God. He loves us and made us for a purpose. We are living souls. We are His creation, yet because of sin, we did not belong to Him. His valuation of us is so great that at tremendous cost, He was willing to pay the ultimate price to purchase us.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved." John 3:16-17

"Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and one of them shall not fall on the ground without your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear ye not therefore, ye are of more value than many sparrows." Matt. 10:29-31

And as some of the new owners of a mug, cup or vase from that community fair might repurpose their freshly won piece, the Lord, as the new owner, has plans for the life of a previously lost sinner.

"Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." II Cor. 5:17

That evening I saw smiles and excitement on faces as people received their "new" glassware. Luke tells us how much more is the rejoicing in heaven when a precious soul is found.

Either what woman having ten pieces of silver, if she lose one piece, doth not light a candle, and sweep the house, and seek diligently till she find it? And when she hath found it, she calleth her friends and her

neighbours together, saying, Rejoice with me; for I have found the piece which I had lost. Likewise, I say unto you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth." Luke 15:7-10

As the new owners of the glassware may have plans for their new piece, so it is with the Father when He calls a new blood-bought soul into His Kingdom. Praise the Lord!

A CALL TO ACTION

Sometimes we attend things that feel refreshing and delightful. Other times we may be challenged, convicted, and blessed. Women's Retreat 2025 was all of these.

It was a lovely fall day that we gathered at Lake James in Indiana for this annual retreat. I heard figures that would say we've been doing this now for at least twenty years. The crowd was a little smaller than usual, but it was still so wonderful to see many familiar faces - people we have grown to know and love. A new widow, a new mother, glowing young girls who are happily dating, mothers of several who are enjoying a refreshing break from

littles, friends from decades ago, people we haven't seen in many years...it was all so good!

The first session was on "Jesus: The Best News and the Best Example". We were reminded that as God's children we have good news to share! The Good News is the Gospel and it's that Jesus came and made it possible for mankind to be restored to the Father! Jesus gave us a wonderful example of how to share God's love with people, showing compassion, listening, and spending time with people. He loved children. He loved sinners. It touched our hearts to hear Melanie share of how she witnessed her sister, Monica, (who she said is one

of her heroes), kneel down beside a severely handicapped girl in Haiti, who was basically abandoned because of her desperate, pathetic condition and in her filth, Monica showed her love and acknowledged her as a human, just stating her name and reaching out to her. That is what Jesus would do.

Melanie gave us a powerful session on many ways we can open our hearts and let God's love flow out to those around us: neighbors, babies, children who need a forever family, foreigners, ex-cons, and the list goes on. We need to see people as Jesus saw them - loving the lowest and the most unlovable. We can be lukewarm Christians, or we can be committed Christians. She read a reading by Francis Chan on the way to diagnose which one we are and it was rather painful and convicting.

We were encouraged to follow in His steps, not having "The American Dream" as our goal, but a heart for people and a desire to share God's love and The Good News with them.

Pheba Sam spoke next and she does not lack for enthusiasm and passion! She emphasized

how we need to understand God's heart for the lost and embrace evangelism as a joyful calling, not a burdensome duty. We need to share the Gospel clearly and compassionately. She gave very practical pointers on how we can effectively connect with and relate to those that are "down and out" and in desperate need of Jesus. They may have made many wrong choices, but they need to feel love and compassion from us and not judgmental condemnation. We need to share personal experiences with them that may relate to certain feelings or experiences they are having even though our backgrounds and world view may be miles apart. That way they will feel they can connect to us. We need to show them that we care.

Pheba didn't want the session to go in one ear and out the other so we were all encouraged to write down a short testimony about something in our lives and then share it with a partner and have prayer with them.

The singing was beautiful and the songs were so meaningful. Julie St. John led the singing with her lovely clear voice. I love four-part harmony with men's voices, but sometimes, just women's voices hits a tender chord and is so sweet-sounding. The theme song was "So Send I You" and if you really think about those words, it is very moving. It holds special meaning to me as we sang that as a congregation at the service where our daughter and son-in-law were commissioned to go on the mission field. (I sang it through tears at that time.)

Of course, the mealtimes and snack times are always enjoyable for those of us that love food, and I can appreciate the effort made to mix us up to sit at tables with other people that we may not normally choose to sit with. We were divided up to sit at tables where we discussed topics like how to serve: the elderly and handicapped, in the medical field, on foreign mission fields, in parenting, etc.

On Saturday the sessions continued on the same topic, and with more power and conviction. You know what a cattle prod is that they use to shock cattle to get them moving? That's kind of how I was feeling. Like the Lord was trying to make me uncomfortable enough to get out of my comfort

zone, out of my laziness or timidity, and get up and moving! The whole day was truly a call to action!! Pheba challenged us with a time frame. We were encouraged to share the Good News to someone in the next seven days and make an effort to contact someone at least once a month for the next four months. Many examples were given of ideas to do: bake some cookies for a neighbor and look for an opportunity to share the love of Jesus when you give them, reach out to someone facing a hard time, conversing with anyone you meet in town who looks like they need encouragement, orphans, widows, getting involved with prison ministry, crisis pregnancy shelters, ...the list is endless. Just be available for where the Spirit leads you! We should be making a difference in our communities!

Sarah Priest led a breakout session for the young ladies and those who are "young at heart" – her title was "For the One". She spoke about this being a special season of life in which they would be making big decisions about their life and purpose. Using her life as an example, she explained how we can have hopes for our future,

but that God's plans may be different – and beautiful! She went on to give an overview of how God used women to minister in the early church as recorded in the book of Acts. She encouraged the young ladies to think about their unique design, values, and personal mission as they seek God's direction in their own life calling. It was a session filled with love, hope, and encouragement!

Melissa Brock emceed the one session and she shared how she tries to connect to the ladies that come into the crisis pregnancy center where she works, and she has been blessed by something she's observed in another coworker in how she relates to the gals. No matter how broken or messed up their lives are, she would often say, "God made you to be cherished." That would sound like healing balm to anyone! I loved that example!

It was truly a rich and wonderful 24 hours and I sincerely thank all who put time, effort, work and prayers into the convicting retreat. The last song was "Sound the Battle Cry" and I felt like we had just been given marching orders!

Brethren Assembly Proceedings Book Released

A new book entitled "Brethren Faithfulness: Priorities In Perspective" has been released by Brethren Encyclopedia, Inc., and is now available to the public. The book contains transcripts of papers and addresses given at the Seventh Brethren World Assembly held in Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania, in July of 2023.

Every five years representatives of the nine largest Brethren bodies descended from the German Pietist Alexander Mack (1679-1735) gather to spend several days reflecting on their common historical roots. They hear scholarly papers, worship together, and hear what each of the groups is currently focusing on for strategic direction and growth.

This 245-page trade paperback, which retails for \$25 per copy, was edited by Maryland pastor Dan Thornton, who served as chair for the 2023 gathering. The 2023 Assembly marked 300 years since the organization of the first Brethren congregation in America in

Germantown, Pennsylvania, and 100 years of the Brethren presence in Nigeria. Therefore, speakers and scholars focused primarily on the Brethren presence in America during the 1700s.

The book opens with a chapter entitled "What Led the Brethren to America?" and succeeding chapters focus on the expansion of the Brethren movement, the challenge of the American Revolution and impact of Christopher Saur II, the legacy of Alexander Mack, Jr., Brethren attitudes toward slavery, and a summary of 100 years of the Church of the Brethren growth in Nigeria.

Brethren Encyclopedia publishes encyclopedias and monographs of Brethren interest. The group is comprised of representatives of the groups descended from Alexander Mack, which include Church of the Brethren, Covenant Brethren Church, Charis Fellowship, The Brethren Church, Dunkard Brethren Church, Conservative Grace Brethren Churches International, and three groups from the Old Order German Baptist Brethren heritage.
