Yet, once the work is complete, oh how our tone can suddenly change. Why? Not only is the source of frustration removed but we now experience the finished product. The rough road that used to pound away at our shocks and struts and

caused us to slow down a little is now smooth as our tires quietly hum across the new surface. Those freshly painted lines really look nice and stand out and the new reflectors in the road really help our night driving. The added lane really does ease the congestion. The new roundabout clearly moves traffic more efficiently than the old signals.

When we consider construction projects, we should really understand why they take time. Before the new construction can even begin, old things need to be torn up and removed. As construction begins, care must be taken to do things in proper order, at the right time with coordination and precision.

By now, you might have guessed where I'm going with this. As this year's construction season draws to a close and I see the projects that frustrated me and tested my patience over the summer come to completion and I'm now getting to experience the results of the completed work, it has reminded me of how God works in the souls of people.

In II Cor. 5:17, it states that

"...if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." We are born into this world in the image of God and that never changes. However, for believers which also experience the second birth, being born again in Christ, they become a new creature. While our adoption into God's Kingdom is immediate upon being born again, God has work to do in the lives of new creatures and that will take time.

Perhaps an example of this is what the Lord showed Jeremiah regarding what He was doing with Israel. In Jer. 18:1-6, the Lord tells Jeremiah to go down to the potter's house and observe his work. The vessel that the potter made was marred in his hand and so he remade it into another vessel as it seemed good to him.

Further, as Paul wrote to the church at Philippi, believers can be confident that "...he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ." Phil. 1:6

While we may understand that human souls are works in progress, in God's hand, do we sometimes forget and look at someone like we would a road construction project? Do we ever observe the transformation in a fellow believer's life and entertain questions in our mind like...How long is this going to take? Can't they grow in their walk with God any faster? When will they finally get it together?

As with a road construction project, old things in a human soul need to be torn up and removed. Care must be taken to do things in proper order, at the right time with coordination and precision. This is God's work. As we look at a fellow believer's life, maybe we can see God's hand at work transforming their lives, yet progress seems slow. It can be frustrating to us and test our patience. However,

the transformation of a human soul is a different job than road construction and might take considerably more time; maybe a lifetime. And ultimately, we mustn't forget...if we belong to the Lord, we ourselves are currently one of His construction projects. If we struggle with waiting on God's transforming work in the lives of others, maybe this should cause us pause to look inward. We can't see the situation and condition of the soul as the Lord does. In fact, as we examine ourselves, we might find that the Lord is currently working on characteristics of our soul, such as humility, love and patience.

Why do we fall? Perhaps we are moving so fast downhill, of our own accord, that we simply crash into a heap. We may not have learned to step carefully, and perhaps we are running ahead of God's instructions. Remember the words of the old hymn:

O be careful where you step, there are dangers that abound; Then be sure to guide your feet where no evil can be found. In the straight and narrow way only safety is assured, You in this must ever walk if you wish to please the Lord.

O be careful how you step, you must shun eternal woe, There's no path you can retrace, choose the right, then, as you go. And keep moving right along, be not idle by the way, Ever watch the road you tread, so you do not go astray.

O be careful as you step, on the road that leads above, With the Gospel for your guide let your feet e'er move with love. By the single eye of faith, you the perfect way can keep, That will lead you up to heaven. There the great reward you'll reap.

What was going through his mind as he saw the people worshiping another God and Aaron leading them? Had his journey up the mountain been for naught? Imagine Moses' anger as he saw what was happening.

The underlying aspect of that was, the people were looking for some kind of law and

they were not able to trust God to give them laws they could handle.

That brings us up to today. Many people talk about the fact that they do not like laws, they want to do whatever they please and yet those people are under the most stringent of laws imaginable. The laws they are in bondage to offer absolutely no mercy or grace. Why are they willing to sacrifice so much for so little?

Everyone is subject to some law, whether they acknowledge it or not. Take for example a person who says, "Nobody is going to tell me what to do. I'm going to do whatever I want to

do." Then they are pulled over by the police for speeding and now have to pay a speeding ticket. How is that going for them?

It's not that we don't have laws to guide us and direct us. We need to have laws that are going to be effective in enabling us to be what God wants us to be. The laws of man force people to be what "man" wants them to be. Most people don't know any different.

The reason people embrace law is because of fear. We have laws on our books that protect us from robbery and murder and so forth. Yet, those laws do not protect us from anything that is wrong. The laws on our books only show what is currently perceived to be right or wrong.

I believe that is why people fear the wrong thing. They see the laws of our country and realize that for the most part, those laws are not completely working. That is because people fear the wrong thing. They fear, for example, that some law is going to deprive them of some of their rights or from enjoying something that they really delight in. This plays into the carnal nature.

I must say that fear has a good purpose to it. We need to be afraid of the right things. But most people are not afraid of the right things.

Everyone is subject to some law, whether they acknowledge it or not. Everyone is subject to a certain level of fear, whether they admit it or not.

I believe fear in its proper context can be used of God to bring me into a proper respect for God. I believe that is what is really important. I need to fear the right thing and the right thing to fear is God. This fear is the foundation of reverence. What I reverence says a whole lot about what I fear or do not fear.

Obedience flows from trust, which is built upon a personal acquaintance. If I am really going to understand the laws of God, I have to understand God Himself. I need to have a personal relationship with God that will enable me to get to know God and from that, will flow a knowledge and understanding of His laws for me.

If you look at the laws of our country, most of them were established because of something that went wrong and a law was then established to correct the wrong. Some of the laws on our books today are so outdated that they do not even make sense. We are not sure what brought such a law into being. Behind every law is a desire to make the lives of persons subjected to that law better. Often, it falls short of this objective.

When I come to the laws of God, I think the same thing is true. Behind every law of God is a passion of God to make our life better and to bring our life into harmony with His holy nature and character.

If I understand that when I

come to the 10 Commandments, I will begin to understand them more. The 10 Commandments were not written to simply give us a list of "dos and don'ts". Rather, they were set in stone because of God's passion for us.

If I come to the 10 Commandments understanding this, it should open up a brandnew attitude on my part. Every law of God reveals to me some aspect of God and how he desires to relate to me.
