WHAT WILL YOUR LEGACY BE?

Hulk Hogan, Ozzie Osborn and Malcolm-Jamal Warner. You may have heard these names in years past and you may have also heard these names recently in the news as all three of these celebrities passed on in late July.

Hulk Hogan became a millionaire through a career in wrestling with the World Wrestling Federation (later World Wrestling Entertainment) and was widely regarded as one of the greatest wrestling stars. Ozzie Osborn was a song writer and musician who made his riches in heavy metal rock and was often known by fans as the “Prince of Darkness”. True to form, he famously bit the head off a bat during a concert performance. Malcolm-Jamal

Warner was wealthy from his career as an actor, director, producer and musician best known for his performance on the TV program “The Cosby Show” in the 1980’s and 1990’s.

For fans, the legacies of The Hulk, Ozzie and Malcolm are generally encapsulated within the previous paragraph. By general definition, a person’s legacy is the long-lasting impact of particular events, actions or character that took place in the past that were part of a person’s life.

Most people desire that their life would have some meaning after they’re gone; that their life will have an impact and influence on the next few generations. However, all legacies aren’t equal in value. Scripture tells us

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that secular legacies based on wealth or fame are temporary and fleeting. With that in mind, what will your legacy be?

Recently Bro. Andrew Carlin held a Bible study for our congregation on this very topic, specifically evaluating what a Godly legacy looks like and whether that will be our legacy.

The lesson touched on the importance of knowing and teaching God's word in the home... *"And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."* Deut. 6:7

The lesson also included the necessity of patiently and diligently applying God's word in our personal lives... *"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of*

the throne of God." Heb. 12:1-2

Further, we were reminded that we are not alone in pursuing a Godly legacy but rather, are part of a much larger legacy that all believers are part of; that of Jesus Christ and His eternal Kingdom... *"Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity."* I Tim. 4:12

As we consider our lives, we should realize the value of being part of the legacy of Jesus Christ. And as we desire that our life would have positive meaning and effect on the current generation as well as on those after we are gone, might we remember that we will have the most success by surrendering our lives to the one that has a guaranteed and everlasting legacy: the Lord Jesus Christ. *"Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised; and his greatness is unsearchable. One generation shall praise thy works to another, and shall declare thy mighty acts."* Ps. 145:3-4

I allowed the sin Jesus forgave to be the Lord in my life. I well remember that astonishing day when I discovered the direction of my life. It was a sad day and yet it was a turning point in my life.

I can bemoan my past as much as I want to, but it never will get me to where God wants me to be. God forgave me of my sin through the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ for a purpose. Of course, one purpose is for me to go to heaven. I greatly embrace that thought and look forward to it. But one thing I really did not quite understand was that the forgiving power of Jesus Christ affects my life today and gives direction to my tomorrow.

My sin limited me and encumbered me with the burden I could barely bare. As we know in Chapter 16, Shimei cast stones and cursed David and his servants, and at this point Abishai wanted the liberty to kill Shimei. But David did not extend that liberty to Abishai. Here in Chapter 19, we see a replay of Abishai wanting to kill Shimei. But David extended grace to Shimei.

We don't know all the reasons David extends this grace, but we do see a side of David that shows his willingness to forgive someone that has done him wrong.

I see that as a real challenge in today's culture and even in church culture: extending grace and mercy in forgiveness and moving forward together in close friendship. It seems we have

the verbal 'I Forgive You' down pat, but to walk from that point in unison as brother to brother without a wall being built is a great challenge.

This was a situation that was between David and Shimei, but Abishai wanted to step in and take care of things. Do we ever find ourselves being an Abishai in a situation? Do I become a conflicting factor of a relationship when I should really be in the shadows in prayer? Or when I am in David's shoes, do I look for the Abishais to 'help' my cause? Do we at times make a much bigger deal out of a situation than needed? Such might be avoided if we learn the art of extending grace and walking together as brethren.

I see this as a great challenge, people. Let us follow the heart of Jesus as we walk through the challenges that come our way.

She knew when upcoming events were being held in the family and could tell you the location (and even the fastest way to get there). The past week preparing for the funeral, her skills were sorely missed.

Mom lived for the church, her family, and her grandkids. She was always present for her kids' school activities, cheering us on. She served as PTA president and was the little league score keeper. Her grandkids lovingly referred to her as "the grandma with the cookies". She was an amazing cook and loved to serve her family and others with her gifts.
